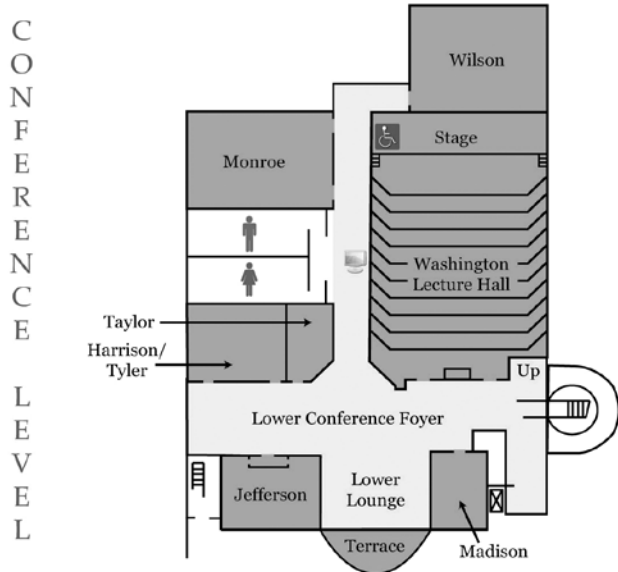
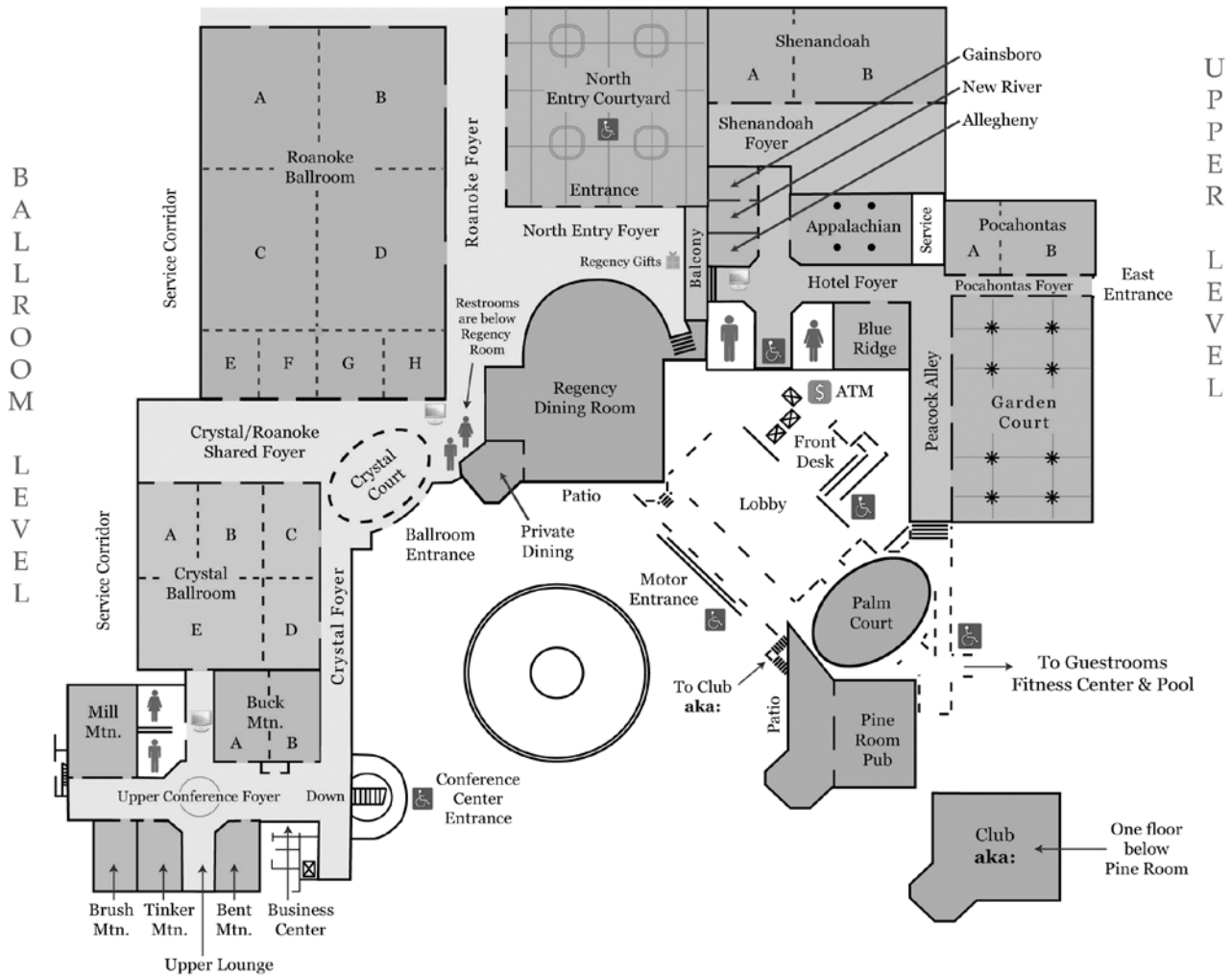

Welcome

“2010 - The Decade of Innovation: Unlimited Possibilities, Unprecedented Perspectives, Unparalleled Potential” is the theme of the 83rd Annual Virginia Middle and High School Principals Conference & Exposition, aka “the Summer Conference.” The state conference has been sponsored by the Virginia Association of Secondary School Principals (VASSP) and the Virginia Department of Education (VDOE) annually since 1927. Beginning in 2007, the Virginia Foundation for Educational Leadership (VFEL) has been collaborating with VASSP and VDOE to present what has become *the* instructional leadership, administration, and policy conference for middle level and high school principals and assistant principals in the Commonwealth.

Effective principals rely on performance systems – SOQ, SOL, SOA, NCLB – for measurement and control, setting direction, making strategic decisions, and achieving desired goals. Indeed, the basic task of school leadership is setting direction and achieving desired goals. This task is accomplished with professionally trained teachers delivering effective classroom instruction and principals all working together for the common goal of student achievement.

Informal discussion and direct supervision can be used to ensure that the goals are being managed effectively. However, as demands on education have increased, particularly with the added emphasis of competing in a global economy, and at a time of drastic cutbacks in public school education, these basic techniques have obviously become more difficult.

At the heart of the problem is a series of tensions — between innovation and control; between flexibility and structure; between the goals of the principal and the goals of the classroom teacher (and others attached to the school); and, between various opportunities to create value in the marketplace and the scarce amount of time and dwindling resources available.

The Summer Conference will address the strategies that effective principals use to set direction and achieve desired goals for the schools they lead. The issues to be addressed will answer the following questions:

- How can principals leverage the potential for innovation in their schools and, at the same time, ensure adequate control and accountability for what is being taught?
- How can principals develop instructional strategies that enhance, rather than dilute, the curriculum?
- How can principals communicate school strategies and performance goals effectively to all teachers?
- How can principals organize and dedicate various kinds of resources to support the implementation of school strategies?
- How do principals measure and track performance toward strategically important goals?
- How can principals ensure that their schools are not exposed to unacceptable levels of risk?
- How can principals move information from teachers, who are in day-to-day contact with students, back up the hierarchy to those in central office who share responsibility for formulating and supporting school improvement strategies?

Throughout the conference the focus will not only be on the reality-based performance measurement and control systems for schools, but also on the possibility thinking of what could be! The principles and techniques discussed will be applicable to all goal-oriented school administrators interested in maximizing performance and pursuing unlimited possibilities, unprecedented perspectives, and unparalleled potential.

This year's education topics continue to emphasize the role of the principal in increasing student achievement through the following nine strands:

School Leadership, Administration, and Management
SOL/Curriculum and Instruction/Remediation
SOA/Accountability
NCLB/AYP/Teacher Quality/LEP/Special Education
Assessment and Data Analysis
Instructional Technology
Student Services and Programs (e.g., school safety, discipline, dropout prevention)
Personal, (e.g., stress management, time management, health and fitness awareness)
Educational Law and Policy

VASSP, its foundation — the Virginia Foundation for Educational Leadership (VFEL), and VDOE have continued to collaborate on a number of projects during the past academic year as part of the Association's continuance of its **Principal 21C** Initiative, including working with school divisions and individual schools on the school improvement model as developed by the VDOE Office of School Improvement and the continued expansion of Breaking Ranks II and BRIM training in secondary schools.

The Summer Conference is an opportunity to both encapsulate the leadership advances of the past school year and to set goals and priorities for the VASSP, VDOE, VFEL, principals, schools, and school divisions to work together in the coming year.

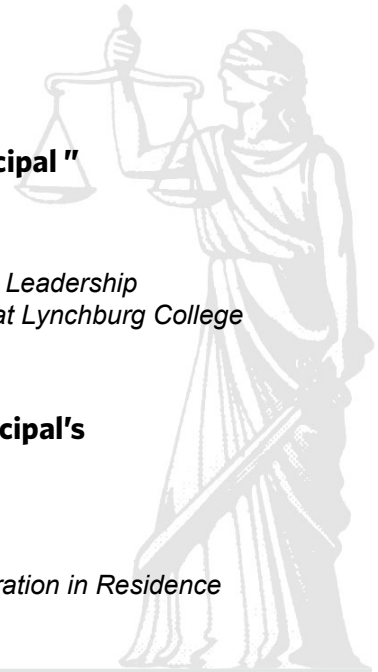

VDOE has been working with four Virginia school divisions to develop an early warning toolkit for school and school division use. The data tools provide information on incoming 9th grade students' risk for not graduating from high school and serve as a resource that permits high schools and divisions to monitor student status and interventions throughout the 9th grade year.
